Location of Europe


- Strictly speaking, Europe is not a continent but a westward extension of Asia.
- Along the coast, it has many inlets which result in the formation of peninsulas jutting into the sea. So it is called the 'peninsula of peninsulae'.
- Most part of Europe lies in the temperate zone as it stretches from 35°N to 80°N latitude.
- Its longitudinal stretch is from 10°W to 60°E.
- The Prime Meridian, 0^o longitude, passes through Greenwich & London.




Mountain Ranges

- The Balkans, also sometimes referred to as Southeast Europe, is a geographical and cultural region in the southeastern part of the European continent.
- It's east of the Italian Peninsula in the western and northwestern part of Anatolia (Turkey) plateau.

The Mediterranean the largest is inland sea in the world.

The Mediterranean, which is surrounded by Asia, Africa, and Europe, connects to the Atlantic Ocean through the Strait of Gibraltar, to the Black Sea through the Sea of Marmara and the Straits, and to the Red Sea through the Suez Canal.
